Propers

Each Sunday there are Propers: special prayers and readings from the Bible. There is a Collect for the Day; that is a single thought prayer, most written either before the re-founding of the Church of England in the 1540s or

written by Bishop Thomas Cranmer, the first Archbishop of Canterbury after the re-founding.

The Collect for the Day is to be read on Sunday and during Morning and Evening Prayer until the next Sunday. If you have a hard time remembering, "Do I read the Collect from last Sunday or next Sunday during the week?" Remember Sunday is the first day of the week. There are also two Bible readings, the Epistle and the Gospel. While they are "lessons", they are not the First Lesson and the Second Lesson, they are the Epistle and the Gospel. The Epistle is normally a reading from one of the various Epistles, or letters, in the New Testament. The Gospel is a reading from one of the Holy Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The Collect is said by the minister as a prayer, the Epistle can be read by either a designated reader (as we do in our church) or by one of the ministers and the Holy Gospel, which during the service in our church is read by our minister or deacon.

The propers are the same each year, except if a Red Letter Feast, that is one with propers in the prayerbook, falls on a Sunday, then those propers are to be read instead, except in a White Season, where it is put off. Red Letter Feasts, so called because in the Altar Prayerbooks the titles are in red, are special days. Most of the Red Letter Feasts are dedicated to early saints instrumental in the development of the church, others to special events. Some days are particularly special and the Collect for that day is to be used for an octave (eight days) or an entire season, like Advent or Lent.

Today, the propers for today can be found on Page 90-92:

ALMIGHTY God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which thy Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the quick and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal, through him who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, now and ever. Amen.

Dru Arnold read the Epistle for today, which comes from Paul's letter to the Romans, starting at the Eight Verse of the Thirteenth Chapter. Paul tells us to be self sufficient, but love and care for one another, do not commit adultery, do not murder, steal or lie. But more than that, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." For, if you love your neighbor, you will do no ill to him. "Therefore love is the fulfilling of the law." We need to do this today, because the time of "our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light. Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying." We hear often "The end of the world is near." And it may well be. But for each of us, this world's end comes when we leave for the next. Have we treated our fellow beings as



Jesus commanded us in God's name? Because in the answer to that is hidden the key to our next life.

OWE no man any thing, but to love one another: for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law. For this, Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not kill, Thou shalt not steal, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Thou shalt not covet; and if there be any other commandment, it is briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. Love worketh no ill to his neighbour: therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light. Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying. But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof.

Hap Arnold read today's Holy Gospel which came from the Gospel according to Saint



Matthew, the Twenty-First Chapter, beginning at the First Verse. It is the story of Palm Sunday when Jesus came triumphant into Jerusalem. Jesus sent "two disciples, saying unto them, Go into the village over against you, and straightway ye shall find an ass tied, and a colt with her: loose them, and bring them unto me. And if any man say ought unto you, ye shall say, The Lord hath need of them; and straightway he will send them. All this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet, saying, Tell ye the daughter of Sion, Behold, thy King cometh unto thee, meek, and sitting upon an ass, and a colt the foal of an ass." This was done that the prophecy of years gone past might be fulfilled of a triumphant entry of the Messiah into Jerusalem. The people expecting a Prince of this

World, "spread their garments in the way; others cut down branches from the trees, and strawed them in the way. And the multitudes that went before, and that followed, cried, saying, Hosanna to the son of David: Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest. And when he was come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved, saying, Who is this? And the multitude said, This is Jesus the prophet of Nazareth of Galilee." Rather than assuming the crown of this world, "Jesus went into the temple of God, and cast out all them that sold and bought in the temple, and overthrew the tables of the money-changers, and the seats of them that sold doves, and said unto them, It is written, My house shall be called the house of prayer; but ye have made it a den of thieves."²

THE EXHORTATIONS.

¶ *At the time of the Celebration of the Communion, after the prayer for the whole state of Christ's Church, the Priest may say this Exhortation. And Note, That the Exhortation shall be said on the First Sunday in Advent, the First Sunday in Lent, and Trinity Sunday.*

DEARLY beloved in the Lord, ye who mind to come to the holy Communion of the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ, must consider how Saint Paul exhorteth all persons diligently to try and examine themselves, before they presume to eat of that Bread, and drink of that Cup. For as the benefit is great, if with a true penitent heart and lively faith we receive that holy Sacrament; so is the danger great, if we receive the same unworthily. Judge therefore yourselves, brethren, that ye be not judged of the Lord; repent you truly for your sins past; have a lively and stedfast faith in Christ our Saviour; amend your lives, and be in perfect charity with all men; so shall ye be meet partakers of those holy mysteries. And above all things ye must give most humble and hearty thanks to God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, for the redemption of the world by the death and passion of our Saviour Christ, both God and man; who did humble himself, even to the death upon the Cross, for us, miserable sinners, who lay in darkness and the shadow of death; that he might make us the children of God, and exalt us to everlasting life. And to the end that we should always remember the exceeding great love of our Master, and only Saviour, Jesus Christ, thus dying for us, and the innumerable benefits which by his precious blood-shedding he hath obtained for us; he hath instituted and ordained holy mysteries, as pledges of his love, and for a continual remembrance of his death, to our great and endless comfort. To him therefore, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, let us give, as we are most bounden, continual thanks; submitting ourselves wholly to his holy will and pleasure, and studying to serve him in true holiness and righteousness all the days of our life. *Amen.*

an unblemished dove" without fault for a sacrifice, then reselling the same sparrow in the afternoon. They were indeed making the temple a den of thieves rather than a place of worship.

Sermon – Rev Deacon Jack Arnold – Time and Action

Amen.

To cast off the works of darkness and don the armour of light, we must turn to Christ, who came to visit us, born in a simple and humble inn in Bethlehem. As His manner of birth, we must be humble as well, not boastful and proud like the rich³, but meek and lowly, to embrace light and cast off the works of darkness. Though He came in a rather humble manner, He shall return in a glorious and majestic manner, a rather stark contrast to His original incarnation, leaving no doubt who has come to lead us.



We must not be for God in speech only, but in deed. For many in the very same crowd who cried “Hosanna” on Palm Sunday were there early on Good Friday. What did they cry for then?

“Crucify Him, Crucify Him!”

Pilate asked for them to cry for mercy, they cried for vengeance on their Lord and Savior!

A swift 180° turn from “Hosanna to the Son of David”.

We must not be like them. We must put on the great Armour of Light and to reject our former lives of sin and vanity.

Through following His Word and Instructions, we shall be given a greater reward than anything existent on the Earth; past, present or future, that gift of immortal life, life for all eternity, that will outlast this physical world. To don the armour of light is not merely putting it on, you have to utilize it, and utilize the helmet, the buckler and

sword (Scriptures and Christ's teachings). You need the who complement of weaponry to go into combat with the Prince of Darkness in this fallen world.

The COLLECT prayer for Advent makes reference to two significant comings of Christ. The first as a man, born of a woman, to fulfill those promises made sure in Abraham. His first coming was to save us from our sins and to bear the severity of judgment due to all sinners. The second mention is of His coming, not to be judged, but to receive His own and execute judgment against all who have rejected Him.

Advent Season heralds the Coming of the long-expected Jesus to save His people. The journey of Christ did not begin at Bethlehem, but in the Council of Heaven long before the worlds were made.

As we learn concerning Abraham, Christ says that Abraham longed to see His coming, and he saw it! The Coming of Christ passed through the life of Abraham.

The same road of Christ Coming has passed through the hearts of every Christian called and accepted. It is my prayer that that road has led to your heart and not found a dead-end there. The Gospel text (Luke 1:5-25) relates the preparation of the first coming of Christ in a physical body for the redemption of our souls. He came as a babe in a manger. However, John the Baptist was born of an aged mother, Elizabeth, by promise of God through Gabriel, much like the birth of another Child of Promise, Isaac. The miraculous birth of these two saints of God is dwarfed by that miracle of virgin birth which will accompany the Birth of God's only Begotten Son.

The first coming was humble and quiet – the Second shall light up the heavens with the Angel Choir and the trumpets of the Lord. His first coming provoked contempt from the rulers and the wealthy. His second coming shall strike fear and anguish into those rebellious hearts that rejected His first visit.

The coming of Christ is at least three-dimensional and not two. He came as a baby at Bethlehem 2,000 years ago. He is coming again at the consummation of all time. But He comes daily into the heart that is open to His coming. But His coming is even more than these three examples.

The moment that it was decreed by God, in eternity past before the worlds were made, Jesus was on that Coming Road. That road stretches all the way to the distant past in the dimness of eternity before time was. He has traveled that long road. Along the way, He has taken mercy upon Abraham and received him into His Kingdom, He received Isaac and Jacob and their spiritual Seed as well. In fulfillment and consummation of His promise to be our Redeemer, that road led to Bethlehem, Egypt, Nazareth, Galilee, Bethany, Sychar, and Jerusalem (to mention only a few examples).

That Road led eventually to a hill called Calvary beyond the western gate of Jerusalem where He died in payment of our sins upon the cross. The Road then led to a lonely tomb in the Garden, and three days later, to a resurrected glory. He walked the shores again of Galilee and witnessed to hundreds.

Then the Road led to the Mount from which Christ rose into the glories of His Father. The Road of His coming does not stop with the Ascension of Christ – it continues to the glorious Kingdom of His Father where Christ is preparing a place for all who are the chosen and elect of God.

The Road continues on to that point in time, of God's own choosing, in which there shall be no more time. Christ shall descend in glory riding upon a white horse, and leading the Armies of Heaven. His glorious Person shall be too brilliant for the sinner to behold. They shall hide in the covert rocks, and hide their faces from the glaring brightness of His coming. Those who drove the crude nails into His hands shall bow the knee along with Hitler and Mussolini, and Stalin, and Mao, and all desperate

sinners. But those who have received Him, shall be received BY Him to join Him in the air.

Do you wonder about the date and time of Christ's coming? Fret not. Perchance, He may come for you today. Rejoice in that hope.

Christ, being the Word, is our Bread of Heaven – our very Bread of Life! And how is Christ like Bread?

When we eat physical bread, it must be handled with clean, sanitary hands and vessels. The grain has been crushed as at Calvary. Many grains are crushed to make the bread just as many saints are crushed by the world. (Abp Cranmer)

The mixing of the bread is simple and plain without the adding of the leaven of sin. We bake the bread well, and then take it into our mouths to chew well before swallowing. This we do with God's Word. Our meditating on the Word is our 'chewing of it'.

We do not gulp it down on Sunday's only, but take time to chew it well. We swallow the bread and it goes deep into our bosoms to be digested and made into our very body and cell tissue. God's Word, too, must become a constituent part of our souls. The nutrients from the bread are then carried by the blood to every cell in our bodies. The nutrients from the bread give us life and energy. So does the Word of God, well-digested and delivered to every part of our heart (first) and then our souls by the blood (Holy Ghost). If we fail to consume that physical bread daily, we grow weak in strength (faith) and may even die without that Bread of Life.

The Bread is only formally taken in the Church at Holy Communion on special days of observance, but it must be taken casually every day, every hour, and every moment by those who love the Bread.

Have you had your bread today?

Bishop Dennis Campbell's Sermon

Person, not Chance

Psalm 50, Malachi 3:1-6 & 4:4-6, Luke 1:5-25

The First Sunday in Advent

December 2, 2012

I think people often miss the point of the Scriptures by focusing their attention on the people in the Bible instead of the God of the Bible. I have, for example, heard many sermons on Genesis 37:4, which have been about parenting and the evils of favouritism by parents. Parental favouritism is a great evil, and the relationship between Jacob and Joseph and the rest of the sons of Jacob plainly show the devastation it can cause. But that is not the point of Genesis 37:4. The point is that God has a plan

for Israel, and His plan includes getting Joseph into Egypt to provide for Israel during the coming famine.

I think people make the same mistake with the passage we just read in Luke. They see a story about Zechariah and Elizabeth and John, but the passage is not really about them. The passage is about God. That's why it was designated to be read on the First Sunday in Advent, when we begin to focus our attention on what we are to believe about God.

What does this passage teach us to believe about God? First; God has a plan. The birth of John the Baptist was no accident. It was not through blind chance that Zechariah served at the table of incense that morning. It was not through blind chance that Elizabeth was unable to conceive a child. It was not through blind chance that she finally did conceive a child who was John the Baptist and did all of the wonderful things John did. God has a plan, and all of these events are part of the plan of God, to prepare the way of the Lord.

This means the birth of Christ was no accident. We say, "of course not, for Christ's sacrifice was planned before the foundations of the earth were laid, and He had to be born before He could die." True, but what about the timing and circumstances of His birth? The Bible makes it clear they were part of God's plan, too. God had been working in history to bring the world to the fullness of time when all things were prepared for the birth of the Saviour. Jacob and Joseph were part of that plan. Egypt was part of that plan. Moses and the deliverance of Israel from Egyptian slavery were part of that plan. Ruth was part of it. David was part of it. Bathsheba was part of it. Babylon was part of it. Even Greece and Rome were all part of God's plan, and each played its part exactly as God, the Planner, directed.

Part of God's plan is the calling and redeeming of a people to be His own unique Kingdom. The citizens of His Kingdom are called out of many nations and backgrounds, but all are called out of sin and into righteousness. They are forgiven of sin and dressed in the righteousness of God Himself, who died for their sins in Christ. These people begin a new life in God's fellowship and blessings. Israel was the foundation of that Kingdom in the Old Testament. The Church of the New Testament is the continuation of that plan. God's promises to Israel are being fulfilled in the Church. We, who are in the Church live in the era in which God's promises are beginning to be fulfilled. The Bible calls this era, the "last days," meaning the last era before the return of Christ and the full completion of His plan.

But I want to move beyond the plan of God to the God of the plan. I want to know what it means that God has a plan. I'm going to make some statements here, and ask you to tell if they are correct or not.

First, only a mind can make a plan. If anything happens by blind chance, regardless of what happens, whether it be order or chaos, it is still only an accident. It isn't meant to happen and it isn't meant not to happen because there isn't anyone to mean or not mean it. Whatever happened was accidental, had no meaning or purpose, came from nothing and returns to nothing. Of course, blind chance is impossible, for even chance requires something to exist before anything can happen to it, and existence comes from God on the basis of His purpose and direction. So the existence of anything negates all possibility of blind chance.

But, here is the point; if only a mind can make a plan, God is a mind. God thinks. God has purpose, intentionality, intelligence, and thoughts. He is not a mere cosmic force. He is a mind.

Second, only a personal being has a mind. A galaxy does not have a mind. A planet

does not have a mind. Even that weed trimmer that won't start when we want it to does not have "a mind of its own." A cosmic "Force" as portrayed in the *Star Wars* movies would not have a mind. It would be simply a form of energy that can be used and controlled if you know the right tricks. That's why even religions that believe in a cosmic force also can believe in personal gods, like Krishna and Kali. Only a person can have a mind and only a mind can have a plan.

Third, God is a Person. He is a Being. In fact all personhood and being exist in Him. The salient point of our reading in Luke is not just that John was no accident; it is that John is part of a master plan, formed in the Mind of a great Person and Being who is able to both make a plan and to make His plan work.

So this is the first thing we emphasise in what we are to believe about God: He is a Person. He "lives," He thinks, He makes plans. He is a Being.

Second, God is able to make His plans work. Imagine all the generations it took to produce Noah. Then think of all the generations it took to produce Abraham and Sarah, and Moses and Mary and Joseph. All of these people existed and did what they did because God was working it all out in His own way and His own time. Think of all the "coincidences" that brought Zacharias and Elizabeth into the world, brought them to marry one another, and remain childless. Think of all the things that had to happen to get Zacharias into the Temple that morning and to serve at the incense altar. They weren't coincidences. They were all part of the plan of God working into place in His own time and His own way. They didn't happen by chance; they happened because God made them happen.

There is much more I want to say, but it will have to keep for other sermons. For now let me close with this point: God is able to make His plans reality. Because He is able, we can trust His promises. If He can cause John to be born at just the right moment in history, and cause Christ to be born at just the right moment in history, and even raise Him from the dead. He can keep His promises to you, now and forever.

Sermon for the First Sunday in Advent

In our gospel lesson (St. Matthew 21:1-13) for today we learned that our Lord entered the city of Jerusalem fulfilling the words of the prophet Zechariah (9:9), Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout O daughter of Jerusalem: behold, thy King cometh unto thee: he is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass and upon a colt the foal of an ass.

Now such a description hardly reflects the image of a kingly personage of the ancient world because they, for the most part, rode about on horses. But consider also Zechariah 14:1-21. The prophet was given to speak again of the Messiah but in a much different fashion. He speaks of him coming with power and great glory to rescue Jerusalem and Judah from the nations which have been gathered together to destroy her. Specifically look a verse 9, And the LORD shall be king over all the earth: in that day shall there be one LORD, and his name one. Thus he who came in humility to bring us the gift of salvation (Zechariah 9), will return in glory to triumph over the forces of darkness and usher in his kingdom (Zechariah 14).

These and other passages regarding the Messiah were given to the writers of Scripture by the Holy Ghost. The gospel accounts contain the very words of our Lord wherein he revealed to the disciples that he must suffer, die and rise to life again, and afterward, to ascend to the very presence of the Father until he returns. Every time we recite the words of the Apostles' or Nicene Creeds, we are proclaiming these important tenets of our faith.

Jesus Christ came to proclaim the good news of salvation; and agreeable to Scripture, he came first as a lowly and humble teacher. He came to satisfy that pressing need of humanity for a Saviour: one who would shed his blood on behalf of his elect so that they might have life eternal with the Godhead. The carnal and the uninformed have even questioned the necessity of his death. We might answer such a query by stating that when Adam and Eve sinned against God they brought death into this world, and ever after, their descendants would bear the infection of original sin. There is nothing human beings can do to save themselves from this hereditary disease. Self-justification cannot wipe us clean, nor could we offer to God anything approximating the value of our lives (Psalm 49:7-8).

Original sin made it necessary for God to enter his creation and take upon himself as the second person of the Trinity the sins of the whole world. As the St. John wrote in his gospel account (1:14) And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us (and we beheld his glory, the glory of the only begotten of the Father), full of grace and truth. He had to experience life as a mortal and yet remain sinless. As St. Paul penned in Hebrews (4:15) For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. To co-opt pagan Caesar's quote: Christ came, Christ saw, and Christ conquered.

Consider Isaiah 9:6, 7: For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, The mighty God, the everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the LORD of hosts will perform this.

Nevertheless, the skeptic and the critic will continue to smirk in denial when they hear those verses. They cannot accept the King of Glory because they have not faith. The words of Scripture may reach their hearts, but the devil comes and snatches away their understanding of it preventing them from accepting our Lord Jesus as the Christ, the Messiah, the Prince of Peace. Their foolish hearts have been darkened, and a veil has descended over their eyes. Thus they have been blinded by the god of this world to the truth of God's word written (II Corinthians 4:4).

We Christians know who our Lord is: he is the Christ, the Son of one, true and living God, who completed his work of redemption and has ascended into heaven where even now he is seated at the right hand of the Father interceding for us until he comes again. While many Jews in our Lord's day accepted him as the Messiah, most did not. And such has been true for people the world over in the years following his ascension. Before every people, kindred and tongue, God, through his witnesses, has set forth his words of life via the gospel of our Lord, for he is that one way, one truth and one life in whose name and under whose blood all who truly believe can find redemption from sin and death.

The Scriptures tell us of Christ's first coming, and of that day in the future when God will send him back to the earth. And when he comes again, he will be riding a fine white horse as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. St. John in the Book of Revelation (19:11-21) was given just such a vision. No more will he ride a humble donkey. No more will he come in humility and seeking to save the lost. He will come again with glory to judge both the quick and the dead whose kingdom shall have no end (The Nicene Creed). He will come with great signs and wonders in the heavens and with a mighty host of his angels and saints.

The question is: Will you be ready? Are you watching for his coming? Have you prepared your heart to receive him? Will you run to him when comes, or will you run away from him? We know that he will come to collect his church, but that day and hour has not been given to us. Until then, we must be content to know the times and the seasons.

The devil and his minions will tell us that we have plenty of time to make up our minds about salvation, but such is a false choice. We should ever keep our hearts turned toward God and on watch for his imminent return. Keep your lamps trimmed and have extra oil so as not be caught unawares when the Bridegroom cometh to lead us to his marriage feast. We have not been called to wrath, but to salvation. Christ has promised us that he will come again for us and so it is our duty to work in his harvest until he calls us home; and so, in the words of an old hymn, "work for the night is coming when man shall work no more" for Behold, thy King cometh unto thee.

Let us pray:

O MOST holy God, who hast made provision for us unworthy sinners through the meritorious life, death, resurrection of thine only begotten Son; empower our witness to those who are mired in sin that they might learn of him and be saved; and this we ask in the name of him who is the King of kings and Lord of lords, even Jesus Christ. Amen.

What is the "Liturgical Year"?

Liturgy based Christian churches who consider themselves catholic, or universal, use a Christian Calendar which has a pre-set annual cycle of liturgical seasons which determines when Feasts, Memorials, Commemorations, and Solemnities are to be observed and which portions of Scripture are to be read.

Distinct liturgical colors are used in connection with different seasons of the liturgical

year. The dates of the festivals vary somewhat between the Western (Roman Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran, and Protestant) churches and the Eastern Orthodox Churches, though the sequence and logic is the same.

The dates of many feasts vary from year to year (Moveable Feasts) due to the variation in the date of Easter, and all other dates follow from that. The extent to which the feasts and festivals are celebrated also varies between churches; in general Protestant churches observe far fewer of them than Catholic and Orthodox churches, and in particular are less likely to celebrate feasts of the Virgin Mary and the Saints.

The liturgical cycle divides the year into a series of seasons, each with their own mood, theological emphases, and modes of prayer, which can be signified by different ways of decorating churches, vestments for clergy, scriptural readings, themes for preaching and even different traditions and practices often observed personally or in the home.

In churches that follow the liturgical year, the scripture passages for each Sunday (and even each day of the year in the Anglican tradition) are specified by a list called a lectionary. Anglicans and Lutherans have traditionally followed the lectionary since the days of the Protestant Reformation. Since the 1960s, the adoption and use of lectionaries in other Protestant churches (Methodist, Reformed, United, etc.) increased. This has led to a greater awareness of the Christian year among Protestants in the later decades of the 20th century, especially among mainline denominations.

Biblical calendars are based on the cycle of the new moon. The year is from the first new moon on or after the spring equinox to the next new moon on or after the spring equinox, rather than an arbitrary starting point like the modern calendar.

Western Christian liturgical calendars are based on the cycle of the Roman or Latin Rite of the Catholic Church, including Lutheran, Anglican, and Protestant calendars since this cycle pre-dates the Reformation.

Generally, the liturgical seasons in western Christianity are:

- Advent
- Christmas
- Green Season (Time after Epiphany)
- Lent
- Easter
- Green Season (Time after Trinity)
-

Advent From the Latin *adventus*, "arrival" or "coming", the first season of the liturgical year begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve. Historically observed as a "fast", its purpose focuses on preparation for the coming Christ.

Although often conceived as awaiting the coming of the Christ-child at Christmas it also points towards the final coming of Christ.

This period is marked by the Advent Wreath, a garland of evergreens with four candles. Traditionally, the wreath is made of four candles in a circle of evergreens. Three candles are violet and the fourth is rose. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday of Advent. Although the main symbolism of the advent wreath is simply marking the progression of time, the church attaches themes to each candle, most often 'hope', 'faith', 'joy', and 'love'. Color: Violet or Blue. On the third Sunday of Advent, also called Gaudete Sunday, Rose/Pink is used.



Historically, the primary sanctuary color of Advent is Purple. This is the color of penitence and fasting as well as the color of royalty to welcome the Advent of the King. Purple is still used in Catholic churches. The purple of Advent is also the color of suffering used during Lent and Holy Week. This points to an important connection between Jesus' birth and death. The nativity, the Incarnation, cannot be separated from the crucifixion. The purpose of Jesus' coming into the world, of the "Word made flesh" and dwelling among us, is to reveal God and His grace to the world through Jesus' life and teaching, but also through his suffering, death, and resurrection.

To reflect this emphasis, originally Advent was a time of penitence and fasting, much as the Season of Lent and so shared the color of Lent. In the four weeks of Advent the third Sunday came to be a time of rejoicing that the fasting was almost over (in some traditions it is called Gaudete Sunday, from the Latin word for "rejoice"). The shift from the purple of the Season to pink or rose for the third Sunday Advent candles reflected this lessening emphasis on penitence as attention turned more to celebration of the season. Churches other than Anglican have changed colors and emphasis on the whole wreath, we remain true to tradition. Maybe we are just slow learners or not so open to change for change' sake.

The word Advent means "coming" or "arrival. " The focus of the entire season is the celebration of the birth of Jesus the Christ in his First Advent, and the anticipation of the return of Christ the King in his Second Advent. Thus, Advent is far more than simply marking a 2,000 year old event in history. It is celebrating a truth about God, the revelation of God in Christ whereby all of creation might be reconciled to God. That is a process in which we now participate, and the consummation of which we anticipate. Scripture reading for Advent will reflect this emphasis on the Second Advent, including themes of accountability for faithfulness at His coming, judgment on sin, and the hope of eternal life. In this double focus on past and future, Advent also symbolizes the spiritual journey of individuals and a congregation, as they affirm that Christ has come, that He is present in the world today, and that He will come again in power. That acknowledgment provides a basis for Kingdom ethics, for holy living arising from a profound sense that we live "between the times" and are called to be faithful stewards of what is entrusted to us as God's people. So, as the church celebrates God's entry into history in the Incarnation, and anticipates a future consummation to that history for which "all creation is groaning awaiting its redemption", it also confesses its own responsibility as a people commissioned to "love the Lord your God with all your heart" and to "love your neighbor as yourself. "

I
In a large city, on Christmas eve in the biting cold, I see a young child, still quite young, six years old, perhaps even less; yet too young to be sent on the street begging, but assuredly destined to be sent in a year or two.

This child awakes one morning in a damp and frosty cellar. He is wrapped in a kind of squalid dressing-gown and is shivering. His breath issues from between his lips in white vapor; he is seated on a trunk; to pass the time he blows the breath from his mouth, and amuses himself in seeing it escape. But he is very hungry. Several times since morning he has drawn near the bed covered with a straw mattress as thin as gauze, where his mother lies sick, her head resting on a bundle of rags instead of a pillow.

How did she come there? She came probably from a strange city and has fallen ill. The proprietress of the miserable lodging was arrested two days ago, and carried to the police station; it is a holiday to-day, and the other tenants have gone out. However, one of them has remained in bed for the last twenty-four hours, stupid with drink, not having waited for the holiday.

From another corner issue the complaints of an old woman of eighty years, laid up with rheumatism. This old woman was formerly a children's nurse somewhere; now she is dying all alone. She whines, moans, and growls at the little boy, who begins to be afraid to come near the corner where she lies with the death rattle in her throat. He has found something to drink in the hallway, but he has not been able to lay his hand on the smallest crust of bread, and for the tenth time he comes to wake his mother. He finishes by getting frightened in this darkness.

The evening is already late, and no one comes to kindle the fire. He finds, by feeling around, his mother's face, and is astonished that she no longer moves and that she has become as cold as the wall.

"It is so cold!" he thinks.

He remains some time without moving, his hand resting on the shoulder of the corpse. Then he begins to blow in his fingers to warm them, and, happening to find his little cap on the bed, he looks softly for the door, and issues forth from the underground lodging.

He would have gone out sooner had he not been afraid of the big dog that barks all the day up there on the landing before their neighbor's door.

Oh! what a city! never before had he seen anything like it. Down yonder from where he came, the nights are much darker. There is only one lamp for the whole street; little low wooden houses, closed with shutters; in the street from the time it grows dark, no one; every one shut up at home: only a crowd of dogs that howl, hundreds, thousands of dogs, that howl and bark all the night. But then, it used to be so warm there! And he got something to eat. Here, ah! how good it would be to have something to eat! What a noise here, what an uproar! What a great light, and what a crowd of people! What horses, and what carriages! And the cold, the cold! The bodies of the tired horses smoke with frost and their burning nostrils puff white clouds; their shoes ring on the pavement through the soft snow. And how every body hustles every body else! "Ah! how I would like to eat a little piece of something. That is what makes my fingers ache so."

II

A policeman just passes by, and turns his head so as not to see the child.

"Here is another street. Oh! how wide it is! I shall be crushed to death here, I know; how they all shout, how they run, how they roll along! And the light, and the light! And that, what is that? Oh! what a big window pane! And behind the pane, a room, and in the room a tree that goes up to the ceiling; it is the Christmas tree. And what lights under the tree! Such papers of gold, and such apples! And all around dolls and little hobby-horses. There are little children well-dressed, nice, and clean; they are laughing and playing, eating and drinking things. There is a little girl going to dance with the little boy. How pretty she is! And there is music. I can hear it through the glass."

The child looks, admires, and even laughs. He feels no longer any pain in his fingers or feet. The fingers of his hand have become all red, he cannot bend them any more, and it hurts him to move them. But all at once, he feels that his fingers ache; he begins to cry, and goes away. He perceives through another window another room, and again trees and cakes of all sorts on the table, red almonds and yellow ones. Four beautiful ladies are sitting down, and when any body comes he is given some cake: and the door opens every minute, and many gentlemen enter. The little fellow crept forward, opened the door of a sudden, and went in. Oh! what a noise was made when they saw him, what confusion! Immediately a lady arose, put a kopeck in his hand, and opened herself the street door for him. How frightened he was!

III

The kopeck has fallen from his hands, and rings on the steps of the stairs. He was not able to tighten his little fingers enough to hold the coin. The child went out running, and walked fast, fast. Where was he going? He did not know. And he runs, runs, and blows in his hands. He is troubled. He feels so lonely, so frightened! And suddenly, what is that again! A crowd of people stand there and admire.

"A window! behind the pane, three pretty dolls attired in wee red and yellow dresses, and just exactly as though they were alive! And that little old man sitting down, who seems to play the fiddle. There are two others, too, standing up, who play on tiny violins, keeping time with their heads to the music. They look at each other and their lips move. And they really speak? Only they cannot be heard through the glass."

And the child first thinks that they are living, and when he comprehends that they are only dolls, he begins to laugh. Never had he seen such dolls before, and he didn't know that there were any like that! He would like to cry, but those dolls are just too funny!

IV

Suddenly he feels himself seized by the coat. A big rough boy stands near him, who gives him a blow of his fist on the head, snatches his cap, and trips him up.

The child falls. At the same time there is a shout; he remains a moment paralyzed with fear. Then he springs up with a bound and runs, runs, darts under a gateway somewhere and hides himself in a court-yard behind a pile of wood. He cowers and shivers in his fright; he can hardly breathe.

And suddenly he feels quite comfortable. His little hands and feet don't hurt any more; he is warm, warm as though near a stove, and all his body trembles.

"Ah! I am going asleep! how nice it is to have a sleep! I shall stay a little while and then I will go and see the dolls again," thought the little fellow, and he smiled at the

recollection of the dolls. "They looked just as though they were alive!"

Then he hears his mother's song. "Mamma, I am going to sleep. Ah! how nice it is here for sleeping!"

"Come to my house, little boy, to see the Christmas tree," said a soft voice.

He thought at first it was his mother; but no, it was not she.

Then who is calling him? He does not see. But some one stoops over him, and folds him in his arms in the darkness: and he stretches out his hand and--all at once--oh! what light! Oh! what a Christmas tree! No, it is not a Christmas tree; he has never seen the like of it!

Where is he now? All is resplendent, all is radiant, and dolls all around; but no, not dolls, little boys, little girls; only they are very bright. All of them circle round him; they fly. They hug him, they take him and carry him away, and he is flying too. And he sees his mother looking at him and laughing joyfully.

"Mamma! mamma! ah! how nice it is here!" cries her little boy to her.

And again he embraces the children, and would like very much to tell them about the dolls behind the window pane. "Who are you, little girls?" he asks, laughing and fondling them.

It is the Christmas tree at Jesus's.

At Jesus's, that day, there is always a Christmas tree for little children that have none themselves.

And he learned that all these little boys and girls were children like himself, who had died like him. Some had died of cold in the baskets abandoned at the doors of the public functionaries of St. Petersburg; others had died out at nurse in the foul hovels of the Tchaukhnas; others of hunger at the dry breasts of their mothers during the famine. All were here now, all little angels now, all with Jesus, and He Himself among them, spreading his hands over them, blessing them and their sinful mothers.

And the mothers of these children are there too, apart, weeping; each recognizes her son or her daughter, and the children fly towards them, embrace them, wipe away the tears with their little hands, and beg them not to weep.

And below on the earth, the concierge in the morning found the wee corpse of the child, who had taken refuge in the courtyard. Stiff and frozen behind the pile of wood it lay.

The mother was found too. She died before him; both are reunited in Heaven in the Lord's house.
