



# Fourth Sunday in Advent

Sunday Report

Today was the Fourth Sunday in Advent, the period including the four Sundays before Christmas; the first Sunday of which is always the nearest Sunday to the feast of St. Andrew (30 November). Advent is a season of preparation and penitence. We prepare ourselves to celebrate the coming of Jesus at Christmas, but we also look forward to his second coming. The liturgical color for this season is purple reminding us of the Kingship of Jesus and that Advent is also a season of penitential preparation.

This weekend, we have had some odd frontal weather, just like last year. Weekend weather has been pretty frontal, with fast moving, but weak, cold fronts moving through. The year has been much colder than before. Thanks be to God for global warming; we are nearly being overrun by mastodons 😊 A few degrees colder and they would have us all. Overnight it was 31°F, with a sunrise temperature of 37°F on Mount Olympus with cloudy skies and variable winds. The start of church brought a lovely 47°F. Even though the weather was marginal, we had three people for the service nonetheless.

### *Gathering Song*

Just in the nick of time, we got Deacon Jack to play our favorite Advent hymn, *Come, thou long-expected Jesus*, for the gathering song.

### ***Come, thou long-expected Jesus***

Come, thou long-expected Jesus,  
born to set thy people free;  
from our fears and sins release us,

hope of all the earth thou art:  
dear desire of every nation,  
joy of every longing heart.

Born thy people to deliver,

## *Propers*

Each Sunday there are Propers: special prayers and readings from the Bible. There is a Collect for the Day; that is a single thought prayer, most written either before the re-founding of the Church of England in the 1540s or written by Bishop Thomas Cranmer, the first Archbishop of Canterbury after the re-founding.

The Collect for the Day is to be read on Sunday and during Morning and Evening Prayer until the next Sunday. If you have a hard time remembering, "Do I read the Collect from last Sunday or next Sunday during the week?" Remember Sunday is the first day of the week. There are also two Bible readings, the Epistle and the Gospel. While they are "lessons", they are not the First Lesson and the Second Lesson, they are the Epistle and the Gospel. The Epistle is normally a reading from one of the various Epistles, or letters, in the New Testament. The Gospel is a reading from one of the Holy Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The Collect is said by the minister as a prayer, the Epistle can be read by either a designated reader (as we do in our church) or by one of the ministers and the Holy Gospel, which during the service in our church is read by our minister or deacon.

The propers are the same each year, except if a Red Letter Feast, that is one with propers in the prayerbook, falls on a Sunday, then those propers are to be read instead, except in a White Season, where it is put off. Red Letter Feasts, so called because in the Altar Prayerbooks the titles are in red, are special days. Most of the Red Letter Feasts are dedicated to early saints instrumental in the development of the church, others to special events. Some days are particularly special and the Collect for that day is to be used for an octave (eight days) or an entire season, like Advent or Lent.

The Propers are found on Page 95-96, with the Collect first:

### **The Fourth Sunday in Advent** *The Collect.*

**O** LORD, raise up, we pray thee, thy power, and come among us, and with great might succour us; that whereas, through our sins and wickedness, we are sore let and hindered in running the race that is set before us, thy bountiful grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with thee and the Holy Ghost, be honour and glory, world without end. *Amen.*

The Collect for the First Sunday in Advent is on Page 90:

### **The First Sunday in Advent** *The Collect.*

**A**LMIGHTY God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which thy Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the quick and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal, through him who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, now and ever. *Amen.*

¶ This Collect is to be repeated every day, after the other Collects in Advent, until Christmas Day.


Dru Arnold read the Epistle for today, which came from Paul's first letter to the Philippians, starting at the Fourth Verse of the Fourth Chapter.

Paul calls on us to "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." We are to lead the world to Christ by example, to "Let (y)our moderation be known unto all men." In this Advent season, as always, "The Lord is at hand." We are to worry about nothing, "but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Be joyful in all things, not for all things. And in the words we find at the end of the Holy Communion Service, may "the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Or to quote another, "Trust in God and Dread Naught."



**R**EJOICE in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice. Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand. Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

Hap Arnold read today's Holy Gospel which came from the Gospel according to Saint John, the First Chapter, beginning at the Nineteenth Verse. When they heard rumor of John the Baptist, Jews wondering if this might be the Messiah, sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who art thou?" John told them, "I am not the Christ." Then, they cast about for who he might be, "Art thou Elias?"



Confounded, they asked, "Who art thou? that we may give an answer to them that sent us. What sayest thou of thyself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord, as said the prophet Esaias." The Pharisees people were somewhat confused and asked, "Why baptizest thou then, if thou be not that Christ, nor Elias, neither that prophet?" John answered them, saying, I baptize with water: but there standeth one among you, whom ye know not; he it is, who coming after me is preferred before me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose."

Interestingly, the same theme is found over and over, as is oft the case with truth. There are those among us who just plain will not see. For, there are none so deaf as those who will not hear and none so blind as those who will not see.

**T**HIS is the record of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, Who art thou? And he confessed, and denied not; but confessed, I am not the Christ. And they asked him, What then? Art thou Elias? And he saith, I am not. Art thou that prophet? And he answered, No. Then said they unto him, Who art thou? that we may give an answer to them that sent us. What sayest thou of thyself? He said, I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord, as said the prophet Esaias. And they which were sent were of the Pharisees. And they asked him, and said unto him, Why baptizest thou then, if thou be not that Christ, nor Elias, neither that prophet? John answered them, saying, I baptize with water: but there standeth one among you, whom ye know not; he it is, who coming after me is preferred before me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose. These things were done in Bethabara beyond Jordan, where John was baptizing.

***Sermon – Reverend Deacon Jack Arnold - Time and Action***

Today's sermon brought the Collect, Epistle and Gospel together and is partly contained in the forewords above.



As is oft the case, today's propers are all tied together. The Collect asks for God's help for us to accept His Help and do it His Way. That is a thought that permeates or at least should permeate our entire lives. It is oft supposed Christians are dour souls, with no sense of happiness or humor. Perhaps this thought comes from those who have heard what the Bible says, filtered through some odd prism, but have never actually read it. After all, the one said to be the most dour of all, Paul, tells us to be happy. Not just happy, but to REJOICE. REJOICE in the Lord ALWAYS and AGAIN I say REJOICE! How much more fun can you have? We are also to be moderate in everything we do, no excesses, an even keel. Work hard, but maintain a time and space for our family, honor

our country, and above all honor God. He goes on to tell us if we think we need something, simply ask God for it! Speaking of God, John recounts John the Baptist's role in preparing the way for Jesus. The Pharisees just had trouble with the simplicity of his message. They were looking for something more complex, less straightforward, something more like themselves.

They were a case of no play, all work and led a rather unbalanced life. We are told to balance ourselves with play besides work, to make us into a happier people that will rejoice in God's commandments and will do His Work without complaint. We will be happier in the end if we do it His Way instead of our way as we are so want to do, which is in our nature. The whole of Scriptures is about us fighting against our nature so that we will be closer to what God intended us to be, a happy and holy people, living together in harmony. If the world would do what God asked, we would be living

together in harmony. Peace on earth will not be possible until the world accepts Him into their hearts. This is the perfect season for those who haven't yet, to accept Him, to acknowledge Him at his first true appearance amongst us, at His Birth.

Jesus also tells us to put our trust in the Lord, then not to worry. He knows how counterproductive, indeed how destructive worry can be in our lives. We know it will do no good, we know it will only hurt our cause; yet we do it. Is this not a proof positive of how much we need His Help? How hard is it to Trust in God and Dread Naught? Very, yet to make progress this we must do. Even though it is very hard to trust somebody you can't see physically, you must trust your spiritual sense and follow Him anyway, knowing that you will see Him physically one day, will be one of our great rewards.

The world is extremely complex; it is full of problems, temptations and difficulties. It is full of obstacles for us, yet all Christianity offers is a few simple solutions. We often hear that there are no simple answers to complex questions. Actually, that is not true. There are simple answers to complex problems, they are the only ones that work. The problem is they are not the answers people want. Most people do not want to know what they are supposed to do, lest they have to do it. They want to be told that what they want to do is at least okay, even though it is clearly not okay.

Once again, when you think about being a Christian, think a bit about these quotes from GK Chesterton:

- "Christianity has not been tried and found wanting; it has been found difficult and not tried."
- "The word "good" has many meanings. For example, if a man were to shoot his grandmother at a range of five hundred yards, I should call him a good shot, but not necessarily a good man."
- "The Bible tells us to love our neighbors, and also to love our enemies; probably because generally they are the same people."
- "Tolerance is the virtue of the man without convictions."
- "A dead thing can go with the stream, but only a living thing can go against it."

G. K. Chesterton (1874-1936)

We are called to a new and different life, we ask the Lord to lead us and follow us, to keep us always. Our goal is to do the Lord's will, not to avoid 613 laws. To do what is right and be humble.

## *Bishop Dennis Campbell's Sermon*

Bishop Dennis is a brilliant speaker. He is able to take biblical precepts and make them perfectly understandable, even to me. Oft he provides the text of his sermons and I take the utmost pleasure in passing them on:



### **What the Bible Says about Us**

Psalm 80, Isaiah 40:1-11, Luke 3:1-17  
Fourth Sunday in Advent  
December 23, 2012

We always need to keep in mind the Bible's primary message is "God." It is about who God is, what He is like, what He is doing, and what His purpose and goal for creation is. So, in today's reading, as well as the readings in the other Sundays in Advent, the message is

not about Zechariah, Elizabeth, or John, so much as it is about what God was doing through them to fulfill His purpose of bringing all things together in Christ. We saw, on the First Sunday of Advent, that John was promised by God as the one who would prepare the way of the Lord. Last Sunday we read of the birth of John as the fulfillment of God's promise to Zechariah and Elizabeth, and also as part of the fulfillment of the much greater Promise to send the Saviour, under whom all things will be gathered together. Today we see God using John in the work for which he was born; preparing the way of the Lord, and calling the people of Israel back to God. So, I want to emphasize that the Bible is about God, but, I don't want to give the impression that people are just props in a Divine Soliloquy. People are part of God's plan, which means God's plan is partly about us. That means the Bible, too, is partly about us. So, using John as an example, I want to talk about what the Bible says about us.

First, the Bible says we are created by God. Genesis 1 makes it very clear that the earth was created to be populated by people. We were no after thought, we were part of God's purpose for His creation. But it is not just people who were created, it was persons. The Bible gives many instances of individual persons being born because God planned and intended them to be. John was one of these persons. John was no accident of blind chance. John was foretold and foreknown by God. He was born to parents past child bearing age. John was a miracle child. But, and this is important, every child is a miracle child. Every child is foreseen and foreknown by God. Before we were conceived, and even before the world was formed, God knew us. We were in God's mind and plan from the beginning. You were no after thought. You were no accident. God knew you before He formed you in the womb.

Second, we are created for a purpose. Let me put it another way, God has a purpose for you. Your life has meaning. You exist for more than simply accumulating toys and gratifying your mental pride and physical desires. Millions of people today spend the bulk of their time and energy trying to "find" themselves. They are looking for an identity and purpose. They are looking for their "passion." Sometimes they look in the craziest places; drugs, toys, amusements, cults, radical causes, self indulgence, or fornication. Yet, after they have indulged every whim and passion, they find they still have an emptiness inside of them. They have not "found themselves."

Not everyone runs amuck in their quest for self. Some people look in more traditional places, like love, marriage, children, meaningful work, and being a "good" person. These people also find an emptiness inside of them that their carefully crafted identities cannot fill. So they continue to search, or they simply resolve to live with the

emptiness.

I think I see something in their quest. I see in it an explicit confession of one of the Bible's foundational teachings about man; they are lost. People are desperately trying to find themselves because they know, deep inside, that they have lost themselves. What they don't know is that they have lost themselves because they have lost God. They are strangers and aliens to God and His ways. But, rather than seeking God, they look for hope and meaning in things that cannot give them. They do not understand what St. Augustine meant when he said; "Thou hast made us for Thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless til we find our rest in Thee."

According to the Bible, your life has meaning and purpose already. You don't have to find it, invent it, or create it. It is given to you by One far wiser than yourself, who knows your needs, and wants better things for you than you can ask or think. Your purpose is to receive and return the love of God. The One who is omnipotent, omniscient, eternal, and Holy, created you to receive and return His love.

How do we return the love of God? By doing His will. When we see John in today's reading, we see him doing the will of God. He is serving God and God's people. But notice that it is not only "ministers" who serve God. All people are called to serve Him in every area of life. When the everyday people asked John what they should do, they were instructed to turn from sin and bring forth fruit worthy of repentance. Publicans, or, tax collectors, were told to gather only what was fair and required, rather than stealing to enrich themselves. Soldiers were told not to abuse civilians, or plunder like pirates. Instead they were to uphold the law and maintain the peace. So even our occupations are opportunities to serve God.

I see in these verses a call that encompasses all people. It begins with the faithful Jewish believers, the ones who do their jobs and care for their families and go to synagogue. They are the people of verse 10. It moves to the marginal Jews, the tax collectors who work for the Roman conquerors. They need to do righteousness too, even in their work. Then it moves to those on the far fringe. They were either Jews who had enlisted in the Roman army, or Gentiles soldiers who had come to Judaism or were attracted by the preaching of John, and wanted to know if it was possible to serve in the Roman army and still serve God. John's answer is to come back to the center. Don't stay on the fringes. Repent of sin. Let your heart be changed for God. Love Him, love His people, and prepare for the Advent of the Saviour. So the call to serve God in all of life is not just for clergy or "saints," it is for all people, and it is your purpose and calling in life.

Third, we need to be enabled to serve God. There is something about us, about our nature, that inclines us away from God. Some call this our sinful nature. Some call it our Adamic nature, meaning the human nature we have inherited from our parents, back to the very beginning. Some call it our natural fallenness. I prefer to call it what our Anglican Articles of Religion call it, "Original Sin." Article IX says Original Sin is the "fault and corruption of the Nature of every man... whereby man is very far gone from original righteousness, and is of his own nature inclined to evil." These words are a very brief summary of a very involved Biblical doctrine, but it is expressed well in verses like 1 Corinthians 2:14; "the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned."

When John came preaching, "repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Mt. 3:2), he was addressing the need to have our natural inclination toward sin repaired. Repentance is to have a new mind and a new way of life. It is to be turned around, so

that instead of going away from God we begin to walk toward Him. More correctly, it is to be turned from a life-style of living apart from God, to a life-style of living in God. So John's call to repent is actually a call to let God renew and re-make your mind and your being, so you will be able to believe in Him in faith and follow Him in faithfulness.

Our Lord called this being "born again" (John 3:16). The Apostle Paul called it being quickened, or being made alive in Christ (Eph. 2:1). He also called it being renewed in your mind. I like the word," regeneration." Paul used it in Titus 3:5, which tells us we are not saved by "works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, by the washing of regeneration and the renewing of the Holy Ghost." I like the word "regeneration" because it reminds me of the Lord's words in Matthew 19:28; "Verily I say unto you, That ye which have followed me, in the regeneration when the Son of man shall sit in the throne of His glory, ye also shall sit upon twelve thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel." Regeneration here refers to the new heavens and new earth, the renewal of creation and its restoration to its original condition as it came from the hand of God in the beginning. When Paul wrote of our regeneration he referred to our being restored to the original goodness and fellowship with God, which man had in paradise. That is what man needs. That is what God is doing in the lives of His people. That is His goal for you.

So the Bible has much to say about us. We were created by God. We were created to love Him and to receive His love. And because of our sin and natural corruption we need to be regenerated so we can be restored to the fellowship and purpose for which God created us. Thanks be to God, Christ is all about restoring us to God.

O Lord, our God, grant unto us true repentance and Thy Holy Spirit, that we may be wheat gathered into Thy garner, and bring forth fruit worthy of repentance, through Christ our Saviour. Amen.

### **Sermon for the Fourth Sunday in Advent**

In our epistle lesson (Philippians 4:4-7) we find the apostle Paul encouraging the church at Philippi to rejoice in the Lord always and in all things with thanksgiving. Unfortunately in today's world, many do not rejoice in the Lord on a daily basis. They focus on their ills and difficulties instead of giving God the glory for what they have already received from his hands. There is an old expression that was made into a hymn entitled Count your many blessings, see what God has done.

The Scriptures are our guide to a life of fellowship with the LORD. In Leviticus 23:40 we read, ye shall rejoice before the LORD your God... In Deuteronomy 26:11 we learn that we should, ...rejoice in every good thing which the LORD thy God hath given unto thee... In Psalm 5:11 we learn of God's expectation for us: But let all those that put their trust in thee rejoice: let them ever shout for joy, because thou defendest them: let them also that love thy name be joyful in thee.

In St. Luke 6:23, our Lord spoke these words of comfort to all who would suffer oppression: Rejoice ye in that day and leap for joy: for, behold your reward is great in heaven... He also spoke of rejoicing because our names are written in heaven (St. Luke 10:20). And we are to rejoice because as Christians, we have an invitation to the greatest feast ever as noted in Revelation 19:7, Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come...

The true worshipers of God will willingly rejoice in the free gift of salvation which comes by means of the shed blood of Jesus Christ. Those who are his will not question his grace. They will not stand skeptically, at a distance, examining with clinical coldness the gift which has been given. Only those who have not received the gift in their hearts will question its validity because as St. Paul noted in I Corinthians 2:14, But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned.

And while it is natural for us to rejoice when our enemies run into trouble. We are warned not to do so. Examine Proverbs 24:17: Rejoice not when thine enemy falleth, and let not thine heart be glad when he stumbleth. God knows who are his now as well as those who will come to him in the future. But we have not been given to know such things. In that light, we should not cheer at the downfall of an enemy today because tomorrow, if God wills, he or she might become a brother or a sister in Christ. It is better to let God judge. For if, in his judgment, they fall and we are preserved it should be enough for us. His will and pleasure has no rival as he is sovereign. For if those who meant us harm are eventually regenerated, then it would be sinful on our part to either wish them ill or rejoice over their errors and misfortunes.

Truly God desires that we rejoice when one has turned from evil and become a brother or a sister in Christ. God is merciful and not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance ( II St. Peter 3:9). As our Lord said, I say unto you that likewise joy shall be in heaven over one sinner that repented, more than the ninety and nine just persons, which need no repentance (St. Luke 15:7).

St. Luke recorded in his gospel account that following our Lord's ascension into heaven the disciples worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy: and were in the temple, praising and blessing God (24:52-53). Later, in the Book of Acts, he wrote about the day of Pentecost where the flaming tongues descended upon the disciples and they began preaching the gospel to all who were in Jerusalem (2:1-11).

Hear now the words of St. Peter as he was moved to speak by the Holy Ghost: For David speaketh concerning [Jesus Christ], I foresaw the Lord always before my face...therefore did my heart rejoice and my tongue was glad; moreover also my flesh shall rest in hope: Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption. Thou hast made known to me the ways of life; thou

shalt make me full of joy with thy countenance (Acts 2:14-36).

To fully realize the joy of God, we must order our lives around his teachings. As St. Paul instructed Timothy, If a man therefore purge himself from [iniquity], he shall be a vessel unto honour, sanctified, and meet for the master's use and prepared for every good work (II St. Timothy 2:21)

So count your blessings this Advent season and be thankful, giving God the glory, rejoicing always in his gift of grace to us through Jesus Christ. Rejoice alway. Again I say Rejoice!

Let us pray,

**O** MERCIFUL and loving God, we rejoice with thanksgiving for thy most wonderful gift of thine all-sufficient grace; we also pray that through the work of the Holy Ghost we would be empowered in our witness to others that they too might come to know Christ as their personal Saviour. For this we ask in his most holy name. *Amen.*
